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

DETAILS ON BARNESVILLE



DIS isn't the abbreviation for distance in this case, but even though a lot of karters took their machinery some great distance, it was well worth the trip from the cold North to sunny Florida and to Daytona International Speedway.

For the first time ever, karts were to test the 3.8 mile oval that has had some of the greatest drivers in the world to have run it before. It's the home of the world famed 24 hour race, the famed Daytona 500, and the motorcycle races held there during SPEED WEEKS in early Feb.

The hospitality of the great crew of Daytona Speedway was just great! From Bill France, President, to the guys picking up the karters who had fallen out of an event. Jim Foster and Track Photographer Lynn Justis were always on hand to assist. All of these people are to be thanked by WKA.

With the race scheduled and being short notice to the karters it was still a well ran event and should prove to be one of the biggest of annual enduro racing of WKA's circuit. The weather was without blemish for the days envolved. True there were bikinis on the beach and a lot of storys to tell the folks back home. Temperatures were in the 80's and record crowds were at Disney World.

Several Kart Shops made the trips with their top drivers to include Comet Kart Sales, of Greenfield, Ind; Margay was represented from St. Louis, Mo; Bystrom Instruments from Chicago; Competition Karting Specialties of N. C.; Griffiths from Harrisonburg, Va; Hi-Speed Products of Fla; and many more. Several states were






3.8 mile course at D I S Karting Olympics

Bystrom was the only real threat to Mark Dismore, the winner of Open Heavy. Mark is a front runner in any kart race from the famed Comet Kart Sales, Ind. Another driver from Comet, the "Boss", Emerson "Diz" Dismore was another front runner earlier in the race but fell out after about 10 minutes into the event. Bystrom finished second and Thomas finished fifth. No. 52 finished 4th.

B-Limited

While he isn't shown in the above picture, Bill Novatny of Chicago, Ill., was the man these karters were going after. Novatny took the lead early in B-Limited to lead every lap thereafter, for a strong Daytona win. Shown above is Bud Roll no. 17, St. Louis, Mo. Bud is a team driver for the famous Margay Kart Mfg. Co. Roll had problem's after battling earlier for a position in the top five. No. 8, Lynn Haddock of Chattanooga, Tenn., follows Roll. Haddock was a first place contender early but went out after 20 minutes of the one hour race. Following Haddock is no. 2 Norman Carver from Ill. Carver finished second to Novatny — Brian Korngold was in contention and ran second most of the race, but you've got to be able to run for an hour as most all Enduro drivers will tell you, and Korngold, although running very strong, had problems late in the event.

Above you're looking at three karts on the highly banked, Daytona International Speedway — you're looking at three karts that were turning the 3.8 mile road course at an average speed of 93.771 mile per hour — you're looking at no. 10 — A national champion — Junior Neal of Greenville, S. C., leading by a slightmargin over another front runner in sprint or Enduro racing, no. 19 Mike Favulli of Mass. No. 3 is Chuck West, of Orlando, Fla., using the fuel he manufactures — Hi-Pro. Neal, Favulli, and West put on a good show for the crowd of approximately 600 who came to Daytona to witness karts for their first time. Neal and Favulli had almost simultaneous pit stops, putting them back in the pack. West went on to lead the race and was overtaken by Roger Mulwee, the W. K. A. Grand National Champion, but neither could withstand the torture of "one hour racing" — West ran out of fuel on the last lap, leaving the win to Donald Rankin of Pennsylvania.



In the Sprint Sit up Class, the 91's and 101's were combined and quite frankly, our score sheets don't match up with the official finish, but here is something similar to what happened.

The 101's made it strong running at the beginning, but as Chuck Hammond of McCulloch says "Clutches took the toll of karts running Mac engines" and no one finished — Well, one did but he was disqualified. Anyway Paul Johnson of S. C. was the man to beat earlier, running in front of Mike Collier, N. C. and James Rebman of Mansfield, Ohio. Johnson had a good lead and had to pit; James Rebman fell out early in the race and Mike Collier ran away with the show but not with any trophys.

91's

Scott Mings and Mike Webber were out in front during most all the race of 91's Sprints and ran away with the win. About three laps from the end, Mings pitted, leaving Webber out front with James Harrell third. Actually we didn't see James come around on the final lap, but the scorers say so — so that left Ford Glenn of Blackburg, S. C. in fourth. It was a disappointing turnout for the Sprints — only three 101's were in the race. Don't you guys in Florida know about the Reed Ltd. class? It would have been a good chance to pick up some "Gold" and run at Daytona for the first time. And believe it or not, all three of those there were out of state. In fact, only 6 91's from Florida were present. The other 8 were from out of state — That means a couple hundred WKA Sprinter's in Florida "ain't racing".




This driver appears to be making a last minute adjustment to his helmet; or is he taking the final draw from his cigarette before the start of B-Open and C-Open race.



The checkered flag is given to Jack Smith of Philadelphia, Pa., the winner of Stock Junior. Jack made it a one man show and was never challanged for the lead — his closest competitor was John Maynard of Dayton, Ohio. But even though John finished second, he was light as he weighed his kart and himself at completion. That's a "No-No" and he was disqualified. This put Tom Gregg up a notch and into second. Gregg is from Pineville, S. C., Paul Greene of N. C. finished third but the winner Smith, had him "in the bag", so to speak, as he lapped Greene on the last lap.

We don't like to repeat ourselves, but probably in every story in World Karting, it's always the same — "Reed Heavy, the largest class of the event." Well, this race was not any different. Reed Heavy was the biggest and a good race it was, with competition at it's best. On the first time around, Dennis Kolp of Lynn, Ind. was

in the first place position. But Dennis didn't last too long. Lynn Haddock took over and led challanger's Buffamonte of N. Y. and Mark Dismore, also Larry Gioe, both of Ind. To make a long story short, Haddock blew it, Buffamonte blew it, and Kolp blew it. Really to sum it up, two drivers were all remaining for the first place position - Aaron Griffith, (Griffith Specialties) and Jerry McCart. They ran side by side for all of the remainder of the race; except for the last 2 laps in which Griffith took the lead for good and won it by 4 seconds over McCart. Mark Dismore stayed in there and won the third place spot. He wasn't but 12 seconds behind with 3 laps to go and was gaining 3 seconds every lap but he parked it on the last lap - still good enough for third place. No. 40 pictured above is a new member of WKA and a new member of Enduro racing. Name: James C. France of Daytona Beach, Fla. - You figure out the rest! (Bet he's got something to do with racing) - Anyway he started in last place (40th position and ran steady for the hour race and finished 14th. Not bad for the first time, Jim!

Skeen and Emerson Dismore put on a good show for second place, until Dis parked it close to the end of the race. But both were after Lynn Haddock. Haddock, the "Chattanooga Flash" was well out front. 


Concentration is the expression of the above crew from Comet Kart Sales – Any idea's on who they were clocking?

C. and no. 17 Scott Mings of Florida, both of whom were putting pressure on Smart at the first of the race. Mings was running second and spun out. Johnson was running second and had his problems. Mark Dismore led the 4th, 5th and 6th laps; then Roy Bystrom of Bystrom Instruments of Chicago, took over. It was he and Mark from there out. And a close race it was. However, Roy finally managed to pull away in the late stages and won the Stock Heavy race by over 25 seconds. After Dismore, Dennis Kolp, Ind. and Rick Blackwelder of Fla. fought for the third and fourth places with Kolp in third at the end. A couple of early retirer's from the race were Stanley Snyder, Fla. and Mark Puchett of Fla. also to include Griffith.

Again, it was Mark Dismore at first but Hunk Hollowell of			
Chesapeake, Va. was not to be left out. He and Mark ran close for			
over half of the event. Dismore led for 20 minutes and an acci-			
dent brought out the red flag. A racer was injured slightly, mark-			
ing the only accident in three days of running. After the race re-			
sumed, Hollowell took the lead back from Mark and while Mark			
was in close pursuit, trouble and a pit stop ended his chance for			
the second place spot. This put Leroy Wilkerson of Conroe,			
Texas in second and James Tilley of Greensboro, N. C. in 3rd.			
The class was combined with the 125cc Stock Reed Class.
